Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world. Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

### SNAP COVID LOCKDOWN As I am sure you

are aware by now. The Premier has extended the lockdown. As of 11.59pm, Thursday 15 July 2021, the following 'circuit-breaker lockdown' measures will apply across Victoria and will be in place until 11.59pm, Tuesday 27 July, 2021 unless otherwise notified.

Face masks must be worn inside and outdoors: everywhere except your own home.

There will be five (5) reasons to leave home:

shopping for necessary goods and services (one person per household, once per day, a support person can accompany if required; within 5km);

caregiving or compassionate reasons;

authorised work or permitted education, or work interstate (if you can work from home, you must work from home); exercise (up to two hour two hours, with one other person or members of your household; within 5km);

receive a vaccination.

Private and public gatherings will not be permitted: Single person bubbles will be allowed.

Prayer and Religious Ceremonies: No in-person gatherings permitted. Livestreaming and Broadcast is permitted with a total of five (5) people present including technicians. It means that our Archdiocesan and Parish Offices will remained closed for the duration of the lockdown, and there will be no Masses here at St John's, until the lockdown is lifted. You are dispensed from your Sunday obligation at this time. At present, live Mass is not available but
